Use a Diva Cup. The Diva Cup is a brand of menstrual cup for use on your period – these cups have several huge advantages over more traditional pads and tampons:

You can leave the Diva Cup in for up to 12 hours, which means less potentially embarrassing situations when bathrooms are scarce!

"Tim Leffel here, editor of the Practical Travel Gear blog.

What do Guatemala, Belize, Mexico, Peru, and the Czech Republic all have in common? They're all countries where I've used the SteriPen to purify my drinking water instead of buying water in single-use plastic containers that end up fouling our land and oceans.

The SteriPen is my favorite piece of travel gear because it saves me money and it saves the planet, all in a compact size that's easy to pack. It's a wand that uses powerful ultraviolet light to purify your water and get rid of anything that could make you sick. I've now used this in nine different countries where guidebooks warn not to drink the water and I haven't gotten the runs or a stomach bug even once. I trust it enough to use it on my daughter too and she's never gotten sick either, in five countries so far.

The SteriPen comes in several models and generally runs 70 to a hundred bucks depending on accessories. It will pay for itself after a month or two of use for long-term travelers. After that it'll save you a fortune. A new model out this summer is even smaller than the others and can be recharged by USB.

If every traveler used one of these, they would keep hundreds of thousands of plastic bottles out of landfills and streams and be doing Mother Nature a huge favor. Go get one."
